As noted above we continue to receive reports of exposure to unvaccinated pets. During the investigation the pet owner is asked about what has led to the lapse in vaccination status. This information is reviewed through our PMQI committee as we look for any improvement opportunities. The most common finding is that the owner reports the pet as current but when we verify with the certificate and/or the veterinarian it is found to have expired. At all clinics we stress with owners the importance of keeping the vaccination record and of when the pet's next dose is due. Availability of clinics or inability to pay is not commonly expressed as a reason.

Zika virus risk and its sequelae continues to be a national and state concern. Our Communicable Disease Nurse and Health Educator continue to share information regarding risk reduction and current guidance to the public, pregnant women and providers through email, local media, website, face book, and community presentations. To date the New York State Department of Health reports that there have been no positive pools of mosquitoes identified in NY. Four hundred eighty eight human cases have been reported in NY with 381 being NYC residents and 28 cases being in pregnant women. To date all NYS cases have been travel related. In terms of other mosquito borne disease there have been zero cases of either West Nile Virus or Equine Encephalitis in humans or equine to date.

Part 4 of the NYS Sanitary Code, Protection against Legionella became effective on July 6, 2016. Subpart 4-1 of these regulations addresses requirements for owners of cooling towers in registering and reporting data regarding the cooling towers to NYSDOH. The regulations also outline establishment of a maintenance program and plan that includes routine Legionella culture sampling /analysis and bacteriological culture sampling/ analysis while the cooling towers are in use, certification of the maintenance program and plan and inspection of the cooling towers. We

have confirmed with NYSDOH that Subpart 4-2 applies to Article 28 licensed general hospitals and residential healthcare facilities but does not apply to Article 28 licensed diagnostic and treatment centers of which Yates County Public Health is. Information regarding these regulations has been shared with Joe Reed of Buildings and Grounds.

**CHRONIC DISEASE:**

Through the Worksite Wellness Committee and the Personnel Office a Biometric Screening event was held on July 12 with good participation from employees. Employees were able to receive biometric screening services through a vendor of Excellus. The results of the screening and individualized health improvement suggestions from Excellus can be used by staff to set goals for maintaining or improving their personal health status.

Through an employee survey there was a request for occasional lunch and learn opportunities, with one suggested topic as Lyme disease. Jennifer Green, Communicable Disease Nurse will work with the Committee to bring a presentation regarding Lyme disease prevention to interested county employees to be held during the lunch break. There was also interest expressed to investigate the ability to offer healthier vending options. Preliminary conversations have occurred with the CSEA and vendors to inquire about modifying the current selections.

**OTHER:**

Yates Substance Abuse Coalition (YSAC): One frequently voiced concern has been treatment and detox availability. NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services recently awarded Cayuga Addiction Recovery Services \$1 million to support the creation of a new 25-bed adult residential treatment facility in Trumansburg. This facility will assist in addressing the current need for additional treatment resources to not only residents of Tompkins County but surrounding counties including Yates.

**Yates County Human Services Committee Meeting  
Pro Action Yates Report  
July 28, 2016**

**Action Items:** No action items.

**Program Updates:**

1. **Nutrition Services:** I have asked Jamie Hojnoski, Senior Nutrition Program Director to attend the Human Services Committee meeting and to provide a brief update on activities in the nutrition program.
2. **Staffing:** All positions are filled. We continue to recruit for substitute drivers in our transportation program.
3. **Fiscal and Contract Update:** We received approval of 2016/17 Annual Implementation Plan and Budget on July 12, 2016. Budget modifications for federal funds included in this budget are due by August 5<sup>th</sup>.
4. **Client Data System Conversion:** NYS Office for the Aging is converting all client data to a new state-wide data system (Peerplace). Beginning August 5<sup>th</sup>, we will have a “go dark” period that lasts until September 15<sup>th</sup>. During the “go dark” period, we will be using manual record keeping systems and after September 15<sup>th</sup>, we will need to enter all data into the new system. We anticipate no problems with this transition, as the new system will look very similar to the Peerplace system that we currently use.
5. **Finger Lakes Caregiver Institute:** Lifespan of Rochester and the Alzheimer’s Association have been awarded grants funds to develop the Finger Lakes Caregiver Institute to 10 upstate NY counties, including Yates County. The Finger Lakes Caregiver Institute is designed to offer programs and services to meet the needs of caregivers and individuals with Alzheimer’s and other dementias. There are many new programs being developed and we will be meeting with the Lifespan team in August to review the new initiative. As part of this work, a Lifespan paid case manager will be located at the Office for the Aging two half days per month.
6. **Grant Submissions and Updates:**
  - a. **Lifespan Elder Abuse Mini-Grant:** The special edition of the Yates OFA newsletter on Elder Abuse is at the printer and we expect to begin distribution in August. Work under the agreement must be completed by September 30<sup>th</sup>.
  - b. **Caregiver respite funding:** We received notice on June 20<sup>th</sup> that our caregiver respite application was approved for \$20,000. The program is for caregiver respite and support for recipients on Medicaid and needing long term care services and supports. The program will run through June 2017 and will be used primarily to purchase in-home and center-based respite services for families.

Soldiers and Sailors Hospital has provided the Adult Single Point of Accountability (SPOA) coordination is losing the staff member than handled this function and has declined to continue in this role. They will continue in the interim. I am negotiating with Lakeview Health Services to assume this role. Lakeview is experienced in this area and provides this program for Seneca and Ontario Counties.

The SPOA is a required service that coordinates residential placements for individuals exiting the Psychiatric Center, Community Psychiatric beds, jail and for individuals losing or in danger of losing housing. It also is a committee representing all housing assets and case and care management services in our community. Our recently opened crisis transitional apartments are managed by the SPOA. The SPOA also serves as a forum for discussion of potential Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) cases and referrals to Assertive Community Treatment (ACT).

Veterans Service Agency (VSA)

I. **Program Updates:**

- **Contact Report:** Our Monthly Contact Report for July shows **254** contacts and **209** services provided (see attached spreadsheet).
- **Transportation:** **15** veterans were transported to various appointments by agency staff and veteran volunteers. **4** veterans to the Bath Veterans Affairs Medical Center (VAMC), **1** to the Canandaigua VAMC, **1** to the Syracuse VAMC, **4** to the VA Rochester Outpatient Clinic and **5** to medical appointments other than VA.
- **Honor Flight:** *Paying tribute to those who gave so much and asked for so little.* Honor Flight Rochester is part of the Honor Flight Network, a non-profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their sacrifices. They transport our heroes to Washington, D.C. to visit and reflect at their memorials. Top priority is given to the senior veterans – they are currently taking World War II, Korean and terminally ill Vietnam era veterans. To achieve this goal, Guardians fly with Veterans on every flight providing assistance and helping Veterans have a safe, memorable and rewarding experience.

The following are a few Yates County Honor Flight updates:

- The mission 49 is scheduled for **September 10<sup>th</sup>** from the Rochester International Airport.
- **20** Veterans and their Guardians are registered for this trip.
- **\$5,500.00** has been raised to defer cost for guardian travel.
- Guardian and informational meeting is scheduled for September 3<sup>rd</sup> at the Penn Yan American Legion post.
- Norm Koek is Penn Yan's Honor Flight local organizer and fund raiser.
- May need to pay for bus transportation from Penn Yan to the Rochester International Airport. Mr. Koek is raising funds to pay for the bus.

Veterans who applied to go will be notified of their status near the end of July. We are still accepting Veteran applications and need Guardians too!

- **Bath VAMC's Veterans Mental Health and Homeless Summit.** The Mental Health Summit was held on **Thursday, July 14<sup>th</sup>**. The Summit was located at the Bath VA Medical Center. The VSA can provide the following upon request:
  - Directory of Bath VA Behavioral Health and Homeless Outreach Services;
  - Resources discussed during Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Impact on the Family presentation.

The purpose of the Mental Health Summit is to enhance the mental health and well-being of Veterans and their family members through increased collaboration between the VA and the community. The goal of the summit is to engage in active dialogue on how we as a community can address the mental healthcare and various needs of Veterans and their families.

- **County Veterans Service Officers Association Annual Conference.** The conference is scheduled for **August 12<sup>th</sup>** at the American Legion Post #230 in Sherrill (Oneida County).
- **Veterans Task Force – NY Serves: Upstate NY Strategy Session 4.** The training session will be held on **August 24<sup>th</sup> from 10:30 PM – 12:00 PM,** at the **Rochester Veterans Outreach Center,** 447 South Avenue. This event is designed for veteran service providers from the local community.
  - **NY Serves - Upstate planning continues and I’m happy to report we’re about three quarters of the way through the development phase of New York State’s second Coordinated Network of resources, services, and care for area service members, veterans, and their families. Rochester’s Veterans Outreach Center (America’s longest-serving nonprofit focused exclusively on the needs of service members, veterans, and their families) will serve as the Coordination Center for NY Serves – Upstate.**
- **Finger Lakes Workforce Investment Board (FLWIB) Veterans Outreach Month.** The FLWIB Veterans Outreach month is **scheduled for November** to coincide with Veterans Day. **Pending Legislation**

The following summary of possible legislation is provided by the New York Public Welfare Association  
*Monthly CPS Caseload Standards*

Legislation (A.10506/S.2691) was passed at the end of the Legislative Session that would direct OCFS to promulgate regulations establishing workload standards for CPS employees. This bill creates workload standards for CPS which would be no more than 15 active cases per month per full-time CPS worker. However, the bill contains no appropriation for the state share or for local costs associated with counties adding more CPS workers. To date, the bill has not yet been delivered to the Governor for his review.

During the session, the NYPWA and NYSAC tracked this bill closely and analyzed it in detail.

The NYPWA made a decision not to take a position on the bill due to the paradox that while it is true that more CPS staff are needed -- the fiscal resources are not provided in the bill.

Below are some possible scenarios for counties to consider:

- 1) If counties oppose the bill and it is vetoed, counties may be blamed for not having enough CPS staff. The media could say that opposition to the bill means that counties do not care about child safety. Any arguments against the bill would be used to put counties in a bad light.
- 2) If counties support the bill and it is signed into law, counties may be expected to cover the cost of adding CPS workers since the bill contains no provisions for funding either the state or local share of the cost.

Possible outcomes:

The Governor could veto the bill, since it has significant budget implications without an appropriation attached – such matters, are intended to be dealt with as part of the state budget process. The Legislature could then bring it up for negotiation in a future budget. If the

Governor wishes to mandate caseloads (he has not said this, to date) he could approve the bill and plan for it in a future budget in two years.

#### **Program Updates**

Summer Youth Employment Program: 35 youth, ages 14 to 19 years old, are placed in 18 worksites around the area through our Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). New worksites this year include Dundee Library, Finger Lakes Premier Properties, Nothnagle Realtors, and Flint Creek Campgrounds. Youth work 10-18 hours per week with varying work schedules.

Workshops at Workforce: There were 30 workshops this month, one of which was a job fair for employers and six of which were Financial Literacy Workshops for our Summer Youth Employment Program. All youth who have jobs must attend this program to learn about bank accounts, how to budget their money, how to balance a checkbook, etc.

Positive Outcomes: Nine High School Equivalency Diplomas were earned in the 2015-2016 fiscal year for Yates County youth due to combined efforts of WFD and FLCC.

Work Experience Placements: We had 10 participants in work experiences this month providing extra hands to assist several agencies and businesses in our area without added cost to them.

#### **Youth Bureau**

All Contracts were sent out July 19<sup>th</sup> to get final review and signatures from all the agencies.

Youth Bureau Director Site visits for summer programming is already underway.

The 2016 Administrative Summary was approved July 5<sup>th</sup>.

Summer Recreation Programs for youth offered by Dundee, Jerusalem, Torrey and Penn Yan are in the final weeks of operation. The Town of Middlesex is holding their Vine Valley Swim Program July 25-July 29.

Rushville Summer Reading program at Mabel D Blodgett Library ran a successful program that will be ending August 1<sup>st</sup>.

Pro Action's Learn, Serve and Earn program will wrap things up on August 3<sup>rd</sup>. The Penn Yan youth completed community service at the Penn Yan Public Library, Penn Yan Manor Nursing Home, the Historical Society, Keuka Lake

School, Humane Society of Yates County, Clinton Crest Manor, Child and Family Resources, Yates Christmas Program and Rainbow Junction. They also participated in the food distribution events as well as the Yates County Fair.

Participants attended a one hour education session each week and then completed 4 hours of community service per week.

Kids Adventure Time was held at the Presbyterian Church this year and will hold its last session on August 4<sup>th</sup>.
